Purchase a composition or a single subject spiral to use as your IB Study Guide for the year. Label the first section *Jane Eyre*.

You will make 5 charts. You may print out formats for these charts and paste them into your notebook, but all the work must be handwritten. Please make this neat and easy to understand.
